The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.


Operational Precautions


To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorised antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.





would a wireline telephone. **Body-Worn Operation**

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body.

Approved Accessories


Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antenna, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.Motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimetres) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:


- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimetres) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your GP may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.














Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- · Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is a phone type especially qualified for use in such areas and certified as "Intrinsically Safe." Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.















Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, bag, or other container with metal objects. Use only Motorola original batteries and chargers.




- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.

- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.











Installing the SIM Card

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.









- · It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.










Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.













Adjusting Volume

Press the 5-way Navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\diamondsuit} \cdot)$ left or right to increase or decrease volume.



- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the key left once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the key right to switch back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.



Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive an MMS message, your phone displays the \$\mathbb{G}\$ (message waiting) indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.


MMS messages that you receive can contain the following media objects:

- Pictures and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- A sound file begins playing when its slide is displayed.
- Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/name and press the VIEW key (image file type), PLAY key (sound file), or OPEN key (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).







Using the Display


The *home screen* displays when you are **not** on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.




The Ξ (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (Ξ) to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left soft key or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone can display an analogue or digital clock in the home screen (see page 74).







1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the $\it i^a$ (no signal) indicator or $\it i^a$ $\bf X$ (no transmit) indicator displays.



Tap Mode Text Entry Rules

- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press ·Ô· left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press ô down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.






Using iTAP™ Mode

iTAP™ software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than Tap mode, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.


For example, if you press [7] [6] [4], letter combinations that match your keypresses display:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press # to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which mode is active (see page 32). If ITAP mode is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 31.
















Deleting Letters and Words



Press the Push to Talk (PTT) key to access the PTT menus, contacts, groups, and settings. For details, see page 59.



Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **SPEAKER** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.











Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, and/or call barring password if necessary.


Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 51).



Using the Phonebook

This section briefly describes basic phonebook operations. For more information about using the phonebook, see page 71.

Shortcut: To open your phonebook from the home screen, press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot$ up or down.

Storing a Phone Number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press the **STORE** key to create a phonebook entry with that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

Select **MORE** to store another number (for example, a work number) for the same **Name**.



Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.


When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press the **RECORD** key. When you are ready, press the **RECORD** key again and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted, press the **RECORD** key and repeat the name. Press the **DONE** key to store the voice name



Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.


You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture displays when you receive calls from the entry.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press the **CHANGE** key. Press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot$ to select a picture, and press the **SELECT** key to store it for the entry.

- To end the call, press 3.

When you receive a PTT Alert tone, press the ANSWER key, press the PTT key, and speak after the tone. You can also press the IGNORE key to cancel the call.

These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organisations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The guidelines include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. Under the guidelines for your phone model, the SAR limit is 2.0 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted in accordance with CENELEC² testing procedures using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it is tested to confirm compliance with the guidelines. The tests are performed in positions that conform to a uniform testing methodology determined by an expert standards body. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is: 1.01 W/kg.³


