

safety and general information

This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.

exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate using your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

operational precautions

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

 The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to May 1, 2007

external antenna care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of antennas, modifications or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

product operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorolasupplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola - or if you hang your mobile device from a lanyard around your neck - keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our web site at: www.motorola.com.

RF energy interference/ compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

follow instructions to avoid interference problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in-flight.

implantable medical devices

If you have an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or defibrillator, consult your doctor before using this mobile device.

Persons with implantable medical devices should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimetres (8 inches) from the implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

driving precautions

operational warnings

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas.

potentially explosive atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted and can include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders.

batteries and chargers

glass parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service centre.

seizures/blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

battery

battery charging

Tip: Motorola batteries have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

Note: You can charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's micro-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. A Motorola Original USB cable and supporting software may be included with your phone. These tools are also sold

Caution: If your computer has a USB hub with multiple USB devices attached, connecting your phone to the USB hub could potentially overload the phone's battery. To avoid any possiblity of overcharging, you should connect your phone to a dedicated USB port on the computer.

Battery Use & Battery Safety

 Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers. Caution: Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage,

- or other hazard. Improper battery use, or use of a damaged battery, may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge., take the following steps:
 - Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;
 - If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
 - If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
 - If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorised Service Centre.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.

separately.

- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool, dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.
- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorised Service Centre before using. Do not attempt to

- dry it with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
- Use care when handling a charged battery—particularly when placing it inside a pocket, bag, or other container with metal objects. Contact with metal objects (such as jewellery, keys, beaded chains) could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), causing the battery to become very hot, which could cause damage or injury.

MMSIM card



Your phone supports compatible Multimedia SIM (MMSIM) cards.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your MMSIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Your MMSIM card contains personal information (such as your phone number and contacts entries) and can be also used to store and retrieve multimedia objects (such as photos and sounds).

Your service provider may supply an MMSIM card with pre-loaded content.

Note: MMSIM cards may not work on your network. Contact your service provider for more information.

Turn off your phone and remove your battery before you install or remove an MMSIM card. Installation and removal of an MMSIM is the same as a SIM card.

see and change MMSIM card information

To see the files stored on your MMSIM card:

Find it: • > $ext{ } •$ Office Tools > File Manager > MMSIM

To copy or move a file from your phone to your MMSIM card, highlight it in the list and press Options > Manage > Copy or Move > MMSIM. You cannot copy or move some copyrighted files.

To **copy files** between your MMSIM card and a computer, you can use a cable connection (see page 58) or a Bluetooth™ connection (see page 60).

Note: When connecting to a computer with a cable, use memory card mode and your MMSIM and memory card will be displayed as separate disks on the computer.

To format your MMSIM card:

Find it: • > S Office Tools > File Manager > MMSIM > Options > MMSIM > Format

To see your **MMSIM available memory,** and other information about the card:



basics

display

The *home screen* appears when you turn on the phone.



Note: Your home screen may look different, depending on your service provider.



To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and .

Press the *centre key* • or the **Main Menu** soft key to open the main menu. (Note that you can't press • to open the menu if you have MOTOCAST headlines running in the home screen.)

Press Shortcuts in the home screen to change the alert profile, change the wallpaper, send or read a message, set the alarm, record a video, turn off the Bluetooth, or find a Bluetooth[®] device.

Press the *navigation key* •**Q**• up, down, left, or right in the home screen to open basic features. To show, hide, or change feature icons in the home screen, see your *Quick Start Guide*.

> Office Tools > Help. Select a Help topic to find information about phone features.

- 3 Bluetooth Indicator Shows Bluetooth status:
 - (solid blue) = Bluetooth powered on
 - (solid green) = Bluetooth connected
 - (flashing blue) = Bluetooth discoverable mode

- Messaging Presence Indicator
 - Shows your instant messaging (IM) status:





To **change** text entry settings and languages:

Find it: '♠' > ❤ Settings > Phone Settings > Text Entry

Change text case: Press ① to change text case to all capital letters (♠), next letter capitalised (♠), or next letter lowercase (no symbol).

Set word learning: Your phone can learn the words you enter, to improve text prediction and completion. Press **Options** > **Text Entry**

> **Set Text Prediction** > **Learn my words**. Your phone shows when word learning is active.

Set text completion: Set your phone to complete words based on the characters you enter. Press Options > Text Entry > Set Text Prediction > Offer completions. Your phone shows when text completion is active.

Enter punctuation: Press to enter punctuation or other characters.


Edit or delete text: Press • • to move the cursor to the right of text you want to edit. Press the *clear/back key* • to delete the character left of the cursor. Hold • to delete the entire work.

word mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to "word" predictive text entry mode. Your phone shows
in the display.

Word mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The phone predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your display might show:




abc mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to "abc" text entry mode. Your phone shows hin the display.

To enter text, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

Character display at insertion point.



After two seconds, the character is accepted and the cursor moves to the next position.

When text completion is activated, your phone tries to guess the rest of the word:

Press • to select the suggested word.

- Press •Q• right to enter the suggested word and a space.
- If you want a different word, press keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.

numeric mode

Tip: Just need one number? To enter a number quickly, press and hold a number key until the number appears.

symbol mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see ...

The display shows the symbol associated with each keypad key. Press • • up/down repeatedly to see different symbols. To insert a symbol, press its key, or scroll to it and press • • .

volume

Press the volume keys to:

 turn off an incoming call alert



- change playback volume for a song or video
- set your phone's alert profile in the home screen (press the volume keys to scroll to a profile, then press • or side select key to select it)

side select key

The side select key gives you another way to do things. For example, when you scroll to a menu item, you can press the side



select key to select it (instead of pressing ••).

external display

When your phone flip is closed, the external display shows the time and indicates phone status, incoming calls, and other events.

set phone ring style in the external display

From the external display, press the external volume keys on the side of your phone to scroll to a profile, then press the side select key to select it.

use touch keys in the external display

When playing music on your phone, you can close the phone flip and use touch keys to control song playback in the external display (see your Quick Start Guide).

Note: Only the music player uses touch key controls in the external display.

voice commands

You can use voice commands to tell your phone what to do.

Note: Not all languages support voice commands.

voice dial a call

You can dial a contact list entry by speaking its name, or dial any phone number by speaking its digits.

- 1 Press the external voice command key on the side of your phone. The phone loads the voice recognition software, then prompts you to say a command or name.
- Wait for the beep, then say the name of an entry as it appears in your contact list. Your phone confirms the name and makes the call.

or

Say "Dial Number." Your phone prompts you to speak the digits in the phone number. Speak the digits. Your phone confirms the number and makes the call.

Tips:

- You can say a contact's name and number type together. For example, say "John Smith mobile" to call the mobile number stored for John Smith.
- For voice command help, press the voice command key on the side of your phone, then press Help.

voice activate phone functions

You can use voice commands to open applications and perform many basic phone functions.

- Press the external voice command key on the side of your phone. The phone prompts you to say a command.
- Wait for the beep, then say a command from the list.

Shortcut: Press and hold the external voice command key on the side of your phone. When the phone prompts you to say a command, say "Talking Phone."

handsfree speaker

During a call, press **Options** > **Speaker On** to turn the handsfree speaker on. Your display shows the speakerphone indicator until you turn it off (press **Options** > **Speaker Off**) or end the call.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas.

Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

You can also change your **SIM PIN** codes or call barring password.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Please verify the Unlock Code: prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press # to enter your six-digit security code instead.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock external keys

You can lock the external phone keys when the phone flip is closed, to prevent accidental key presses when playing music, or when carrying the phone in a bag or pocket.

To **automatically lock** the external keys when the phone is idle and the phone flip is closed:

> External Key Lock > Timer:

You can set the time delay for locking the external keys (4 Seconds, 6 Seconds, or 12 seconds). The keys lock when you close the phone flip, and unlock when you open the phone flip.

To turn off the automatic lock feature:

To **unlock** the external keys when the flip is closed: Press and hold the side select key.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

redial

If you hear a **busy signal** and see **Call Failed**, press or **Retry** to redial the number.

When the call goes through, your phone shows **Connected** and connects the call.

return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and shows **X Missed Calls**, where **X** is the number of missed calls.

When you see the **X Missed Calls** message, press $\stackrel{\bullet}{•}$ to see the **Missed Calls** list. Scroll to the call you want to return, then press \bigodot .

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your phone's display.



Your phone shows the caller's name and picture when they're stored in your contact list, or **Incoming Call...** when caller ID information isn't available.

Note: Picture IDs aren't available for contacts stored on the SIM card.

Tip: Want to know who's calling without even looking at your phone? To give one of your contacts a special ringtone, see page 69.

To show or hide your phone number for the next outgoing call, enter the number you want to call, then press **Options** > **Show ID** or **Hide ID**.

To show or hide your phone number for all calls:

Find it: •• > Settings > Call Settings > In-Call Setup > My Caller ID > All Calls > Show ID or Hide ID

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 999, that you can call at any time, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Check with your service provider, as emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues. Do not solely rely on your wireless phone for essential communications such as medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call: Turn your phone on, exit any open application such as games,

dial the emergency number, then press the *send key* to call the emergency number.

voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number.



Note: Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone display shows **New Voicemail** and the new message indicator $\overline{\ensuremath{\bowtie}}$.

To check voicemail messages:

Shortcut: Your service provider may store your voicemail phone number in speed dial location #1. If so, you can press and hold 1 in the home screen to listen to your voicemail message(s).

Windows Media Audio format offers the optimal balance between file size and sound quality. Song files in this format tend to require more storage space than files that use Windows Media Audio Pro format

Windows Media Audio Pro format is designed for use in portable devices with limited storage capacity. The format provides improved sound quality at lower bit rates.

To set the default file format and bit rate:

- Insert the music CD in your computer's CD drive.
- 2 Launch Windows Media Player 11.
- 3 Select the Rip tab in Windows Media Player 11.

- 4 Click the Rip tab down arrow, then choose Format > Windows Media Audio or Windows Media Audio Pro.
- 5 Click the Rip tab down arrow again, then choose Bit Rate > bit rate.

convert iTunes AAC files to MP3 files on your computer

Use the iTunes desktop application to convert standard iTunes AAC files to MP3 files that are compatible with Windows Media Player 11.

Note: The iTunes desktop application can only convert AAC files ripped from a music CD. It can't convert music files purchased from the iTunes store.

- Open the iTunes desktop application on your computer.
- Select Edit > Preferences, then click the Advanced tab and click Importing.
- 3 Open the Import Using pop-up menu, then select the MP3 Encoder option. Click OK to save your settings.

Select one or more songs in your iTunes music library, then choose Advanced > Convert Selection to MP3.

The converted MP3 file copies appear in your computer's music library alongside the original AAC files.

Bluetooth® wireless

Your phone notifies you when file transfer is complete and saves the file.







This model meets international guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The ICNIRP SAR limit for mobiles devices used by the general public is 2 W/kg and the highest SAR value for this device when tested at the ear was 1.02 W/kg. As mobile devices offer a range of functions, they can be used in other positions, such as on the body as described in this user guide. In this case, the highest tested SAR value is 0.41 W/kg.

As SAR is measured utilising the device's highest transmitting power, the actual SAR of this device while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary.
