# 3.1 Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

# 3.2 Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following instructions

#### 3.2.1 External Antenna Care

If your phone has an external antenna, use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and/or may result in non-compliance with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

## 3.2.2 Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline phone.

# 3.2.3 Body-Worn Operation: Voice Communication

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting voice communications, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure quidelines.

If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

# 3.2.4 Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

## 3.2.5 Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries, antennas, and convertible covers, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

# 3.3 RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

**Note:** Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

**Note:** This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

3.3.1 Facilities

#### 3.3.1 Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

### 3.3.2 Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your device offers a flight mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about use in flight. If your device offers a feature that automatically turns on the phone, then turn off this feature before boarding an aeroplane or entering an area where the use of wireless devices is restricted.

#### 3.3.3 Medical Devices

### **Pacemakers**

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 centimetres (6 inches) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 15 centimetres (6 inches) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON
- · NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

## **Hearing Aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your doctor may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

# 3.4 Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a phone may be distracting in certain circumstances.
   Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.
- · Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

# 3.5 Operational Warnings

# 3.5.1 For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

## 3.5.2 Gas or Petrol Stations

Obey all posted signs with respect to the use of radio equipment in gas or petrol stations. Turn off your wireless device if instructed by authorised staff.

# 3.5.3 Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

**Note:** The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

## 3.5.4 Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

## 3.5.5 Damaged Products

If your phone or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorised Service Centre to determine if it has been damaged. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

## 3.5.6 Batteries and Chargers

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become hot. Take care when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original™** batteries and chargers.

**Caution:** To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

# 3.6 Choking Hazards

Your phone or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your phone and its accessories away from small children.

### 3.7 Glass Parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service centre.

# 3.8 Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone (the flashing-light feature is not available on all products).

Parents should monitor their children's use of video games or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- · Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

# 3.10 Repetitive Motion Injuries

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.

# 7.2 Installing the USIM, SIM, or Memory Card

**Caution:** Do not bend or scratch your card. Avoid exposing your card to static electricity, water, or dirt.

Turn off your phone and remove your battery before you install or remove a SIM card.


Your 3G USIM (Universal Subscriber Identity Module) Card contains your phone number, service details, and contacts list/message memory. Your phone can use GSM SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) cards, but not all features will be available.

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

# 7.3 Memory Card

Insert the Memory Card next to the SIM card. To remove the memory card, slide it out.

The Memory Card provides you with a larger storage capacity than the Phone Memory. When you download pictures, sounds,



video clips, or Java applications, they are saved to the Memory Card.

**Note:** If you download a copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.



7.4 **User Memory** 

**Note:** A key over the icon indicates that the file has a copyright lock that keeps you from saying it on external memory, forwarding it, or editing it.



If you have a TransFlash removable memory card, the use of an SD adapter allows you to use it in other devices that are compatible with SD cards (for example, digital cameras, laptops, mp3-players).

# 7.4 User Memory

Your phone stores any content that you add, like ringtones or games, in user memory. Your service provider may store some content in user memory before you receive the phone.

# 7.5 Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength. temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



For best performance, please use the following charger kit with this device:



# 7.8 Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before using your phone, please install and **fully charge the battery as described below**. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

#### Action

1 Plug the charger into your phone.



- 2 Plug the other end of the charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates Charge complete, remove the charger.


Your phone's battery charging indicator lights up while the battery is charging, and turns off when the battery is fully charged.

**Tip:** You can safely leave the charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

# 7.9 Turning Your Phone On

#### Action

 Press and hold of for 2 seconds or until the display turns on.

- 3 If you want to use a User Account, press ·•• to scroll to the User Account you want. Then press the Select key to select the account from the list (stored on the SIM card).

#### Action

4 If you are prompted, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the **0k** key to unlock the SIM card.

Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.

5 If you are prompted, enter your four-digit unlock code and press 0k key to unlock the phone.

**Tip:** The unlock code is originally set to 1234. Your service provider may change this number before you receive your phone.

To turn off your phone, press and hold for 2 seconds.

# 7.10 Adjusting Volume

Press the up or down volume keys to:

 increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call



- increase or decrease speakerphone volume during a call
- · turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

**Tip:** At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

# 7.13 Changing the Call Alert

**Shortcut:** In the home screen, press the volume keys up or down to quickly change your ring style profile. With your phone closed, press a volume key to see your ring style profile, press the smart key to change it, then press a volume key to store the change.



# 7.15.1 Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

## **Using Capitalisation**


## 7.15.3 Using Tap Mode

This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

Regular **TAP** mode cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. **Tap Extended** also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 26.



In a text entry screen, you can press # to switch entry mode. If you don't see  $\mathbf{Abc1}$  or  $\mathbf{Abc2}$  then press  $\mathbf{Options} > \mathbf{Text}$  Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.



To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter prog you might see:



Press \*\hat{Q}\* right to accept **program**, or press \*\hat{\pi}\$ to reject it and enter a space after **prog**.

If you want a different word (such as progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

- Press �� left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press • • down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press to exit without saving.

# 7.15.4 Using iTAP™ Mode


Press # in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see or , press Options > Text Setup to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP™ software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **TAP**, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.

**Tip:** Your phone has a text tutorial which should help you with any problems.

Find the Feature Options > Text Setup > Text Tutorial

For example, if you press 7764, letter combinations that match your key presses display:



- If you want a different word (such as Progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.
- Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.

## **Entering Words**

In a text entry screen, you can press # to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which mode is active (see page 24). If ITAP mode is not available as the **Primary Text** or **Secondary Text** entry mode, see page 24.


## 7.15.5 Using Numeric Mode

In a text entry screen, press # to switch entry modes until the 123 (Numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press # to switch to another entry mode.







## 9.4.2 Setting Up a Wireless Connection

Your phone supports Bluetooth™ wireless *pairing* (also called *linking* or *bonding*). You can pair your phone with a Bluetooth headset or car kit, or pair your phone with a computer to exchange and synchronise files.

**Note:** The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

### Turning Bluetooth Power On or Off

- If Bluetooth **Power** is **On**, your phone can automatically pair with the handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone.

Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, your phone "recognises" that device in the future. If a recognised device starts a Bluetooth link with your phone, the Bluetooth status icon appears at the top of your display.

**Note:** To extend battery life, use the above procedure and set Bluetooth Power to Off when not in use. Your phone will not pair with devices until you set Bluetooth Power back to On and pair your phone with the devices again.

### 11.3.2 Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



- Press · O· to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

- When an option has a list of possible values, press •Q· left or right to scroll through and select a value.
- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

## 11.4 Smart Key

The smart key gives you another way to do things. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it (instead of pressing ••). The smart key usually does the same thing as ••. To find the smart key, see page 1. To change what the smart key does in the home screen, see page 80.

### 11.5 External Display

When you close your phone, the external display shows the time, date, status indicators, and notifications for incoming calls and other events. After your phone is inactive for a while, the display shows only a clock. For a list of phone status indicators, see page 50.

To set the phone ring style in the external display:

Press a volume key to see Ring Styles.

- 2 Press the smart key repeatedly, until the style you want appears.
- 3 Press a volume key to return to the home screen.

## 11.6 Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speakerphone On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **Speaker** key again or turn the phone off.

**Note:** The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

## 11.7 Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code or PIN2 code, if necessary. Your *Personal Identification Number* (PIN) code protects the information stored on your SIM card.

To change a code or password:

Find the Feature

> Settings > Security> New Passwords

## 11.8 Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 66).

## 12.3 Setting a Ring Style

Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

You can select one of five different ring styles. The ring style indicator in the display shows the current ring style (see page 52).

## 12.4 Ring & Event Lights

Your phone has lights on the outside that can pulse for incoming calls or messages.

To set the light for your incoming calls, press • > Settings

> Ring Styles > Ring Lights.

To set the light for your **incoming messages**, press • > **Settings** > **Ring Styles** > **Event Lights**.



## 12.5 Setting a Wallpaper Image

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your phone's home screen. The wallpaper image displays as a faint watermark in text and menu displays.

When you set an animation as a wallpaper image, only the first frame of the animation displays.

## 12.6 Setting a Screen Saver Image

The screen saver image displays when the phone is on and no activity is detected for a specified time period.

**Tip:** This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image. The screen saver shows when the flip is open and no activity is detected for a specific time. The image shrinks to

fill the display, if necessary. An animation repeats for one minute, then the first frame of the animation displays.



## 13.9 Using Caller ID

Calling line identification (Caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls.

The phone displays the caller's name (and picture, if available) if the name is stored in your contacts, or **incoming Call** Incoming Call when caller ID information is not available.

You can also set your phone to play a distinctive **Ringer ID** for specific entries stored in your contacts. For more information, see page 77.

### 13.9.2 Outgoing Calls

You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.

While dialling (with digits visible in the display), press Outions > Hide Caller ID/Show Caller ID.

## 13.10 Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 112 or 000, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted. Your service provider can program additional emergency numbers into your SIM card. However, your SIM card must be inserted in your phone in order to use the numbers stored on it. See your service provider for additional information on this issue.

**Note:** Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

# This model meets international guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. As SAR is measured utilising the device's highest transmitting power, the actual SAR of this device while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

They note that if you want to reduce your exposure then you can do so by limiting the length of calls or using a "hands-free" device to keep the mobile phone away from the head and body.
