## Menu navigation

1 From the home screen, press Menu (left soft key) to open the apps menu.
Tip: You can also press the
 Select key to open the apps menu.
2 Press the Navigation key 0 up, down, left or right to scroll and highlight a menu option.

3 Press the Select key to select the highlighted option.


## Shortcut keys

From the home screen press ©, up, down, left or right to quickly open Music player, Contacts, Messages, or User profiles.

## Adjust volume

Press the volume keys on the side of your phone to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).

## Home screen

## quick access to the things you need most

Quick start: Home screen
The home screen gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or press $\mathrm{END}^{\mathrm{END}}$ from a menu. It's basically like this:


Press to open apps menu.
Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

## Apps menu

All the apps on your phone are shown in your apps menu.

To open the apps menu, from the home screen, press Menu (left soft key) or $\square$. Press up, down, left or right to highlight a menu option, then press to select the highlighted option. You can press $\mathbb{E W N D}$ to return to the home screen at any time.

## Phone status \& notifications

The status bar at the top of the screen contains icons that tell you about messages and phone status.

During a call, press Spkr On to use the handsfree speakerphone.

## Recent calls

1 From the home screen, press semo to see a list of recent calls.
2 Highlight a call and press sevo to call it. To see call details, press Options > View

## Emergency calls

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

1 Enter the emergency number in the home screen.
2 Press sexo to call the emergency number.

## Create \& send messages

## Receive a message

When you receive a message, your phone plays an alert and shows the new message indicator $\boxtimes$ at the top of the screen.

To read the new message, press View.
To read messages stored in your inbox, press

## Text entry

Use the phone keypad to enter text and create messages or notes. Indicators at the top right of the text screen show the current text entry mode.
Your phone uses T9 software that lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The phone predicts each word as you enter it.

## Turn Bluetooth power on or off

Note: To extend battery life, turn off Bluetooth power when not in use.

## Connect new devices

To connect with a new device, you need to pair with it. You only need to do this once for each device-to connect again, see "Reconnect devices" on page 30.
1 Make sure the device you are pairing with is in discoverable mode (see device instructions).
2 Press > Settings > Connectivity $>$ Bluetooth > Search audio device.
Note: If Bluetooth power is not turned on, your phone will ask if you want to Power on Bluetooth first? Select Yes.
3 Your phone lists the devices it finds within range. Select a device to connect.

4 If necessary, enter the device passkey (like $\mathbf{0 0 0 0}$ ) to connect to the device.
Tip: For specific information about a device, check the instructions that came with it. For more Bluetooth support, go to www.motorola.com/Bluetoothsupport.
For maximum Bluetooth security, always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.
Note: Using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

## Reconnect devices

## microSD Memory card

To format your memory card, press

Warning: When you format a memory card, all data on the card is deleted.
To see files stored on your memory card, press 0 > My Folder > Memory card > Open.
To copy or move a file from your phone to your memory card:
1 Press > My Folder > Phone > Open.
2 Scroll to the file, then press Copy or Move.
3 Select Memory card > Open.
4 Scroll to the destination folder and press Options > Select.

## USB drag \& drop

Note: This feature requires an optional accessory.

You can drag \& drop your pictures, videos, music, and more from your computer to your phone's memory card.

Note: When your phone is connected to a computer, it cannot be used for anything else, including making emergency calls. To restore the phone to normal use, disconnect it from the computer.
1 With a memory card inserted and your phone showing the home screen, connect a Motorola micro USB data cable from your phone's micro USB
 port to a USB port on your computer.
2 Your phone shows a USB config dialog. Scroll to Mass storage and press OK. You can't use the files on your memory card while it is connected.
3 On your computer, use the "My Computer" window to find "Removable Disk."
4 Click on the "Removable Disk" icon to access the memory card.
5 Drag \& drop files between your computer and memory card folders.
6 When you're done, use the "Safely Remove Hardware" feature to finish.

## Codes \& passwords

Your phone password is originally set to 1122. If your service provider didn't change the phone password, you should change it:

## Find it: $\quad$ > Settings $>$ Security settings

 > Change password > Phone password. You can also change your SIM card PIN and PIN2 codes.
## If you forget your phone password: At the

 Input password prompt, try entering $\mathbf{1 1 2 2}$ or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, contact your service provider.If you forget other codes: If you forget your SIM PIN code or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

## Lock your phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. You'll need to enter your four-digit phone password to lock or unlock the phone.
To automatically lock your phone whenever you turn it off:

## Find it: $\square>$ Settings $>$ Security settings $>$ Phone lock.

To unlock your phone:
When you see Input password, enter your four-digit phone password and press OK.

## Crash recovery

In the unlikely event that your phone stops responding to key presses, try a quick reset. Remove the back cover and battery ("Assemble \& charge" on page 4), then replace and turn on your phone as usual.

## Reset

Reset default factory settings on your phone. You'll need to enter your phone password to reset the phone.
Caution: This option erases all information you have entered (including contacts and calendar entries) and content you have downloaded (including pictures, videos, and music files) stored in your phone's memory. After you erase the information, you can't recover it. This option does not delete SIM card or memory card information.
Find it: $\square$ settings > Restore factory settings

## Safety, Regulatory \& Legal

## Battery Use \& Safety

Important: Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage. Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particulary y from the continued use of damaged batteries.

## DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the mobile device or battery come in contact with water.* Water can get into the mobile device's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the mobile device and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your sevvice provider or contact Motorola, even if they appear to be working properly.*
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewely, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
- Don't place your mobile device or battery near a heat source.* Excessive heat can damage the mobile device or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak, or malfunction. Therefore:
- Don't dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dyeer or microwave oven.
DOs
- Do avoid leaving your mobile device in your car in high temperatures.*
- Do avoid dropping the battery or mobile device.* Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.*
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your mobile device or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.
* Note: Always make sure that the battery compartment is closed and secure to avoid direct exposure of the battery to any of these conditions.

Important: Use Motorola Original products for quality assurance and safeguards. To aid consumers in identifying authentic Motorola batteries from non-original or counterfeit batteries (that may not have adequate safety protection), Motorola provides holograms on its batteries. Consumers should confirm that any battery they purchase has a "Motorola Original" hologram.

## Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers. Motorola mobile devices are designed to work with Motorola batteries. <br> If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or

Unable to Charge, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and try charging it again;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola authorized service center.

Important: Motorola's warranty does not cover damage to the mobile device caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
Warning: Use of a non-Motorola battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

## Battery Charging

Notes for charging your product's battery:

- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$ or above $45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$ when charging.
- New batteries are not fully charged.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.


## Driving Precautions

## Seizures/Blackouts

## Caution About High Volume Usage

Warning: Exposure to loud noise from any source for extended periods of time may affect your hearing. The louder the volume sound level, the less time is required before your hearing could be affected.
 To protect your hearing:

- Limit the amount of time you use headsets or headphones at high volume.
- Avoid turning up the volume to block out noisy surroundings.
- Turn the volume down if you can't hear people speaking near you.

If you experience hearing discomfort, including the sensation of pressure or fullness in your ears, ringing in your ears, or muffled speech, you should stop listening to the device through your headset or headphones and have your hearing checked.

## Small Children

## Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

## Exposure to RF Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

## Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

## Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities.
