Understanding this User Manual

The chapters of this guide generally follow the same order as the menus and submenus in your phone. A robust index for quick reference to most features begins on page 147.

Also included is important safety information that you should know before using your phone. Most of this information is near the back of the guide, beginning on page 121.

Notes and tips

Throughout this guide are icons and text that are set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Explain alternative options within the current feature, menu, or sub menu.
- Tips: Provide quick or innovative methods for performing functions related to the subject at hand.
- Important: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance, or even damage your phone.

Activating Your Phone


Contact your Wireless Carrier and follow their instructions for obtaining service, if necessary. We suggest that you read this guide to fully understand the services your phone supports.

Install the Battery

Note: Your phone comes packaged with a partially charged rechargeable standard Li-Ion battery and travel adapter.

Important!: You must fully charge the battery the first time you use your phone, otherwise you could damage the battery.

 Insert the top end of the battery first, matching the gold contacts on the top end of the battery to those inside of the phone.



- 2. Press the bottom end of the battery down into the phone.
- Place the battery cover over the battery and slide the cover upward into place.



Activating Your Phone

Turn Your Phone On

- Press the key.
- 2. The phone begins searching for a network signal.
- 3. Once the phone finds a signal, the time, date and day appear in the bottom of the display.
- 4. You're now ready to place and receive calls.



Tip: Your phone has an internal antenna. Do not touch the phone case over the antenna while using your phone as this can affect call quality and can cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than is necessary.



Note: If you are outside of your Wireless Carrier's coverage or roaming area, the No Service icon () appears at the top of the phone's display. If you cannot place or receive calls, try later when service is available, or at another location.

Turn Your Phone Off

▶ Press and hold the key for two or more seconds. Your phone powers

Note: If your phone is on and you press of for less than one second, the phone will not power off. This prevents your phone from being turned off accidentally.

Remove the Battery

Important!: You must unplug the Travel Adapter (if it is connected) before removing the battery from the phone during charging to avoid damage.

- 1. Press and hold the key to turn off the phone (if on).
- Press the battery cover at point (1) and slide the cover (2) toward the bottom end of the phone.
- Lift the battery cover up and away from the phone, bottom end first.



4. Lift the battery (3) up and away from the phone, bottom end first.



Charging the Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable standard Li-lon battery. Only use Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. **Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.**

Use the Travel Adapter

The travel adapter included with your phone is a convenient, light-weight charger that rapidly charges your phone from any 120/220 VAC outlet.



 Plug the large end of the Travel Adapter into a standard 120 VAC or 220 VAC wall outlet.

Note: For connection to an electrical supply not located in North America, you must use an adaptor of the proper configuration for the power outlet. Use of the wrong adapter could damage your phone and void your warranty.

Insert the smaller end of the Travel Adapter into the charger/accessory connector at the bottom end of your phone.



Note: With the phone turned OFF, a discharged battery recharges fully in approximately 4 hours.

Low battery indicator

The battery indicator (iii) in the upper-right corner of the display indicates power level. Monitor the battery strength and ensure your battery is adequately charged.

- Three bars (IIII) indicate a full charge.
- An empty battery icon () indicates a near empty battery.
- A blinking empty battery icon (
) and a tone sounding indicate you have two to three minutes before the battery is too low to operate the phone.

If you continue to use your phone without charging its battery, the phone shuts down.

Setting Up Your Voice Mail

Voice mail allows callers to leave voice messages, which can be retrieved any time.

Note: Once your voice mail account has been set up, you can use the Voice Mail folder (under the Message menu) to view details of voice messages in your voice mail box.

- In idle mode, press and hold the to dial your own mobile number to dial yoice mail.
- 2. Follow the prompts in the new user tutorial to setup your mail box.

Listen to voice mail

- In idle mode, press and hold the very key or dial your own mobile number to dial voice mail.
- 2. After connecting, you are prompted to enter your password.

Command Keys and Features

- Earpiece/Speaker Plays sounds such as caller voices and call
 progress tones. In Speakerphone mode, plays amplified voices for handsfree calls. (
- Display Displays the numbers, messages, and icons you need to operate your phone.
- Left Soft Key Performs the functions indicated on the bottom line of the display.
- TALK Key This key is used to initiate your calls and to display the All Calls list.

- Voicemail Hot Key In idle mode, press and hold to automatically dial your voicemail account. In T9 Word or Abc text entry mode, press to enter a period (.) in the text.
- Microphone The microphone used during phone calls and voice memo recordings.
- Special Function Keys Enter special characters. Perform various functions.
- Alphanumeric Keypad Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- BACK Key Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
- END/Power/MENU Exit Key Ends a call. Press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off. When you receive an incoming call, press to mute the ringer and send the call to Voice Mail.
- 11. Right Soft Key Performs the functions indicated on the bottom line of the display.
- **12. Navigation Key** In menu mode, lets you browse and highlight menu options.

Command Keys and Features

 Power/Accessory Connector — Used to plug in the Travel Charger and to connect any available accessory cable, such as, handsfree, Teletypewriter (TTY), or Telecommunication Device for the Deaf (TDD) equipment. **14. Microphone** — The microphone used during phone calls and voice memo recordings.

Command Keys

Soft Keys

Functions for the soft keys are identified by labels that appear in the display above each key. There are two soft keys, Left ____ and Right ____.



Left Soft Kev

Some functions of the Left soft key are as follows:

- In standby mode, press the **Menu** (left) soft key () to open the main menu.
- In a menu, press the **OK** (left) soft key () to accept the highlighted selection.
- When the Left soft key function is Edit, press the Edit (left) soft key () to edit a
 Contact.

Right Soft Key

Some functions of the Right soft key are as follows:

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key () to open the Messages menu.
- When the Right soft key function is Back, press the Back (right) soft key () to back up one menu level.
- When the Right soft key function is Option, press the Options (right) soft key
 and a pop-up menu appears.

BACK Key

- If you enter an incorrect character, briefly press ____ to backspace (and delete) the character.
- 2. To erase the entire sentence, press and hold
- 3. To back up one menu level, briefly press
- To return to standby mode, press and hold ____ until you return to standby mode.

End Key

- 1. Press and hold the **End** key [sto*] to turn your phone on or off.
- 2. Briefly press once to disconnect a call.
- Press [web] to return to standby mode from any menu, or to cancel the last input.

Send Key

The **Send** key wus is used to answer calls, dial calls, and to recall the last number(s) dialed, received, or missed.

- 1. Press TALK once to answer calls.
- 2. Enter a number and briefly press TALK to make a call.
- Briefly press number in standby mode to display a list of recent calls to and from your phone.
- 4. Press twice in standby mode to call the most recent number.
- Press mus to pick up a waiting call. Press mus again to switch back to the other call

Navigation Key

Use the directional keys on the Navigation key to browse menus, sub menus, and lists, and to adjust settings. In standby mode, each key also acts as a shortcut to launch applications.

Special Function Keys

Special function keys let you enter special characters and perform special functions. Voicemail Hot Key (1 key)

In standby mode (in addition to entering the number "1" when you are dialing a phone number), pressing and holding the automatically dials your Voicemail account.

When entering text in T9 Word or Abc mode, pressing the very key enters a period (.) in your text. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

Key Lock and Shift Key (* key)

In standby mode, pressing and holding the week key locks the keypad and prevents accidental dialing. Unline Lock mode, you can unlock the keypad lock without the phone Lock Code (see "Lock Mode" on page 19 for more information). Simply press the Unlock (left) soft key (), then press the week.

Understanding the Display Screen

When entering text, momentarily pressing the web key shifts the current capitalization setting between Word/Abc, WORD/ABC, and word/abc.

Also when entering text, pressing and holding the with key shifts the text entry mode between **Word**, **Abc**, and **123**. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

Next Word Key (0 key)

When entering text in T9 Word mode, momentarily pressing the be described by at the end of the word you just entered toggles through any other words with the same key press combination. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

Example: Pressing [==] in T9 Word mode, can produce "and", "bod", and "cod".

Silent Mode and Space Key (# key)

In standby mode, pressing and holding the step places your phone in Silent mode, which silences all tones. To restore these tones, press and hold the step again. (For more information, see "Enter/Exit Silent Mode" on page 20.)

When entering text in T9 Word or Abc mode, pressing the skey enters a space in your text. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

Understanding the Display Screen

- The top line of your phone's display contains icons that indicate network status, battery power, signal strength, connection type, and more.
- The center portion of the display shows information such as call progress information, messages, and photos.



 The bottom line of the display shows current soft key functions. The sample screen shows that pressing the Left soft key () will display the Main Menu, and pressing the Right soft key () will show the Messages menu.

Display Screen Icons

Your SCH-r200 phone can show you definitions of the icons that appear on the top lines of the front and main displays.

To access the Icon Glossary:

▶ In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (□), then press □ (for Settings), □ (for Phone Info), and □ (for Icon Glossary). A list shows of the icons that can appear on the top line of the display.

Dialogue Boxes

Dialogue boxes prompt for action, inform you of status, or warn of situations such as low memory. Dialogue boxes and their definitions are outlined below.

- Choice
- · Example: "Save to draft?"
- Reconfirm
 - Example: "Erase all inbox msgs?"
- Performing
 - Example: "Sending..." "Connecting..."
- Completed
 - Example: "Message Saved"
- Information
 - Example: "New Message"
- Frror
- · Example: "System Error!"
- Warning
 - · Example: "Battery Low," "Memory Full!"

Backlights

Backlights illuminate the display and the keypad. When you press any key or open the phone, the backlights come on. They go off when no keys are pressed within a period of time set in the **Backlight** menu.

Note: During a phone call, the display backlights dim and turn off after one minute to conserve battery power, regardless of the Backlight setting.

For more information, see "Backlight" on page 107.

Your Phone's Modes

Call Answer Mode

You can select how you wish to answer a call.

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (), then press (
 - Any Key Pressing any key except the key answers a call.
 - Talk Key Only pressing TALK answers a call.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight an option.
- 3. Press the \(\subseteq \) key to select the method for answering calls.

Input mode

Input mode determines how you enter text, numbers, and symbols. While at any text entry screen, press the Right soft key () (when creating a text message, also press for Entry Mode), then use the Navigation key to choose the input mode from the pop-up menu. Optional input modes are T9 Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

Tip: You can also cycle between Word, Abc, and 123 by repeatedly pressing and holding **.

Lock Mode

When the phone is in Lock Mode, restrictions are placed on phone use. You can receive calls and messages, but cannot place outgoing calls (except for emergency numbers) until you unlock the phone.

Lock Mode also restricts access to menus and keypad shortcuts. Unlock your phone by entering the lock code when prompted. (For more information, see "Lock Phone" on page 113.)

Standby Mode

Standby mode is the state of the phone once it has found service and is idle. The phone goes into standby mode:

- · After you power the phone on.
- When you press after a call or from within a menu.

In standby mode, you will see the time, day, and date as well as all phone status icons.

- While in standby mode, enter a phone number, and press to place a call
- 2. Press to return to standby mode.

Receive Messages in Standby Mode

You can receive messages in standby mode. An alert tone sounds and a notification message appears in the display when a new message arrives.

- Press the **View** (right) soft key () to view now.
- Press the **Ignore** (left) soft key () to view later.

Talk Mode

You can place and receive calls only when your phone is on. While in a call your phone is in talk mode. Press the **Options** (left) soft key () to display a list of menu options. For more information, see "In Use Menu Outline" on page 36.

Enter/Exit Silent Mode

Silence the tones your keypad makes when you press a key.

- In standby mode, press and hold <a>s
 "Entering Silent Mode" briefly appears in the display and your phone does not play ringtones for incoming calls, sound alert tones, or play keypad tones.
- While in Silent mode and standby mode, press and hold "=""."Exit Silent Mode"
 briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

Vibrate Mode

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (____), then press ____ (for Settings), ____ (for Sound Settings), ____ (for Volume), and ____ for Voice Calls. The current calls ringer volume setting appears in the display.
- Repeatedly press the Down navigation key until Vibrate appears in the display, then press the Set (left) soft key (____).
 Your phone will now vibrate when you receive a call, the keypad tones are silenced, but the phone will play tones for messages, alarms, and alerts.

Adjust the Ringer

 In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (___), then press ___ (for Settings), ___ (for Sound Settings), ___ (for Volume), and ___ for Voice Calls. The current calls ringer volume setting appears in the display. Available options are:

Silence All
Vibrate
1 Beep
Medium
Medium/High
High

Low

2. When you are satisfied with the setting, press the **Set** (left) soft key ().

Note: The Vibrate icon (\\\\)) appears in the display when the phone is in Vibrate mode.

This section explains how to make or answer a call. This section also includes the features and functionality associated with making or answering a call.

Making a Call — Number Entry Dialing

- 1. With the phone on, enter the number you wish to call using the keypad.
- 2. Press the TALK key to place the call.

Dialing Emergency Numbers

You can dial any of the numbers 911, *911, or #911 to place an emergency call.

If you dial 911, *911, or #911 and press the $\lceil n_{LK} \rceil$ key, your phone dials the emergency number 911, automatically.

Important!: Emergency number 911 is hard-coded into your phone. You can dial this number almost any time, even when the phone is locked or restricted.

If you call 911 an audible tone is heard and an Emergency prompt appears in the display for the duration of the call.

Important!: Because of various transmission methods, network parameters, and user settings necessary to complete a call from your wireless phone, a connection cannot always be guaranteed. Therefore, emergency calling may not be available on all wireless networks at all times.

Important!: DO NOT depend on this phone as a primary method of calling 911 or for any other essential or emergency communications.

Dialing International Numbers

Call another country from the U.S.

- 1. In standby mode, enter the three-digit exit code (011) for the United States.
- 2. Enter the country code for the country that you are calling.
- Enter the number that you wish to call, then press the TALK key.

Note: Puerto Rico and Canada are on the North American dialing plan. When making calls to Puerto Rico and Canada it is similar to making calls within the United States, no unique country codes are necessary.

Placing calls when outside the U.S. — Mexico

- Calling locally within Mexico: Dial the seven or eight-digit number.
- Calling long distance within Mexico: Dial 01, plus the ten-digit number (includes area code).
- Calling to the U.S. or Canada from Mexico: Dial 001, plus the ten-digit number (includes area code).

Calling Voicemail from Mexico: Dial 001, plus your ten-digit wireless number.
 Once you hear the recorded prompt, press and enter your passcode.

Manual Pause Calling

When you call automated systems (like banking services), you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time, you can store the numbers in your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- P pause A hard pause stops the calling sequence until you press the half key.
- **T pause** A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.

To manually call a number with pause(s) without storing it to your Contacts:

- 1. Enter the number you wish to call.
- 2. Press the **Option** (left) soft key () . A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - P pause a hard pause (awaits input from you).
 - T pause a two-second pause.
- 3. Use the Navigation key to highlight the desired pause option.
- 4. Press on to enter the highlighted pause into your number sequence.
- 5. Press TALK to call the number.

Making a Call — Contacts Dialing

After you store phone numbers and contact names in your phone's Contacts list, you can dial any Contacts entry without having to remember and enter the entire phone number.

To dial a Contacts entry:

- In standby mode, press the Up navigation key. The Contacts Find screen appears in the display.
- Use the keypad keys to enter the first few letters of the name of a Contacts entry you want to call. (See "Entering Text" on page 41 for more information.)
- 3. Use the Navigation key to highlight the Contacts entry you want to dial.

To dial the Default Number for this Contact:

4. Press the TALK key.

Tip: You can select any number stored in a Contacts entry as the Default Number. See "Assigning a Default Number" on page 50 for more information.

To dial a number other than the Default Number:

- After highlighting the desired Contacts entry, press the View (left) soft key
 The View Contact screen appears in the display.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the particular number you want to dial, then press the [max] key.

Making a Call — Speed Dialing

You can store phone numbers and contact names in your phone's Contacts list. Speed Dialing lets you quickly and easily dial any contact in your Contacts list by using that contact's Speed Dial number in the list. You can assign and change Speed Dial numbers for your Contacts. (See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 56 for more information.)

One-Touch Dialing

Speed Dial numbers 002 through 009 are One-Touch dialing numbers. You can call the Contacts phone numbers assigned Speed Call numbers 002 through 009 by pressing and holding a single key.

Example: For location number 003, press and hold the wey until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Two-Touch Dialing

Speed Dial numbers 010 through 099 are Two-Touch dialing numbers.

Example: For location number 013, briefly press the [1:1] key, then press and hold the [3] key until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Three-Touch Dialing

Speed Dial numbers 100 through 999 are Three-Touch dialing numbers.

Example: For location number 113, briefly press the ve, briefly press the ve key again, then press and hold the ve key until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Pause Dialing From a Contacts Entry

 If you speed dial a contact that contains (two-second) T pause(s) simply wait for the pauses to pass and the dialing to complete. If you speed dial a contact that contains (hard) P pause(s), wait for the appropriate prompt(s) from the number you are calling (credit card number, bank account number, and so on) and enter the appropriate response(s).

Answering a Call

Your phone notifies you of a call in the following ways:

- A ring tone sounds and/or your phone vibrates (Your phone provides: nine ring volume settings including 1- beep, Vibrate, Ringer Off, or Vibrate+Ring, and/or different ring types to distinguish callers.)
- A phone number (unless blocked by the caller) and a name appear in the display (If the caller's number and name are stored in your Contacts list).
- If the caller can't be identified, Call from unavailable#, Call from restricted number, or no number appears in the display.

Your phone continues to notify you of the call until one of the following events occurs:

- · You answer the call.
- · You ignore the call.
- The calling party ends the call.
- · The call is sent to voicemail.

Answering an Incoming Call

Press the TALK key. The ring tone and/or vibration stop and the caller's voice can be neard in the earpiece.

Tip: You can set your phone to answer calls when you open the folder, when you press any key but the key, or automatically. (See See "Call Settings" on page 110 for more information.

Rejecting a Call

When you reject an incoming call, the call is immediately forwarded to your voice mail.

During an incoming call, press the Reject (right) soft key (). The
caller is immediately forwarded to your voice mail.

Tip: You can mute the ringer to ignore an incoming call by closing the folder or by pressing the volume key.

Adjusting the Call Volume

In standby mode, repeatedly press the Volume key (down until the desired Call Volume Level appears in the display. The Volume key is on the left side of phone.

Calls Log

The Calls log retains information about Outgoing, Incoming, and Missed calls. You can also view times for your last call and the time totals for all calls.

Review the Calls Log

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (). The Main Menu appears in the display.
- 2. Press the [see] key (for Calls).
- Press the number key associated with the Calls log that you wish to review or the function you wish to access:
 - Press Total for **Outgoing** calls.
 - Press ___ for Incoming calls.
 - Press and for Missed calls.
 - Press for Erase Logs.
 - Press [0 = = 0] for Call Timer.
 - Press and for Data Counter.

Note: In cases where there is a Contacts match for a Calls log entry, the name associated with the number appears in the display instead of the number.

Outgoing Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 outgoing calls and stores them in the Outgoing calls log. You can review the Outgoing calls log for the time and date of a call, as well as other information.

Note: To quickly view your most recent calls, briefly press will in standby mode. Up to 20 of your most recent outgoing, incoming, and missed calls appear in the display.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press (e=) then press (for Calls) and (for Calls) and (for Calls) and (for Calls) and (for Calls) appears in the display.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight a call, then press _ to view further information about the call.
- Press the Option (left) soft key () . A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number
 - Save Save the number to your Contacts.
 - Prepend Add a prefix to the number.

- Erase Erase the selected call from your Outgoing call log. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the Navigation key to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Incoming Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 Incoming calls and stores them in the Incoming call log. You can review the Incoming call log for the time and date of the call, as well as other information.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press term (for Calls) and for Incoming. A list of your Incoming calls appears in the display.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight a call, then press the key to view further information about the call.
- 3. Press the **Option** (left) soft key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number.
 - Save Save the number to your Contacts.
 - **Prepend** Add a prefix to the number.
 - Erase Erase the selected call from your Incoming call list. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the Navigation key to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Missed Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 missed calls (calls that were never answered) and stores them in the **Missed** call log. You can review the Missed call log for the time and date of the call, as well as other information.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press tem (for Calls) and for Missed. A list of your missed calls appears in the display.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight a call, then press the _ key to view further information about the call
- Press the Option (left) soft key () . A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number.

- **Save** Save the number to your Contacts.
- **Prepend** Add a prefix to the number.
- Erase Erase the selected call from your Missed call list. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the Navigation key to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the \(\bigcirc\) key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Erase Logs

You can erase all calls from the **Outgoing**, **Incoming**, and **Missed** calls logs individually or you can erase **All Calls** from these calls logs at the same time.

Erase All Calls

- 1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press () (for Calls), (4) (for Erase Logs), and (4) for All Calls.
 - "Erase All Calls?" appears in the display as well as the following options:
 - Yes Erases all calls in the Calls log.
 - No Cancels erasing calls.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the desired option, then press the key.

Call Timers

View the duration of your last call, total calls, and calls made during the life cycle of you phone using the Call Timer feature.

Note: Call Timer is not for billing purposes.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press (parallel) then press (for Calls) and (parallel) for Call Timer. The following options appear in the display:
 - Last Call View the duration of your last call.
 - **Total** View the duration of the total call, incoming and outgoing, made on your phone since the last erasure.
 - LifeTime View the duration of all calls on your phone since activation (LifeTime timers cannot be erased).
 - **Erase Total** Erases the counters for the Total call timer.

Press the number of the option you wish enter, or use the Navigation key to highlight the option and press the __ key.

2. Press the FNO® key if you wish to exit the menu.

Data Counter

Use Data Counter to view the amount of data that has been sent or received (or a total of both) using the data services that your phone supports, such as **Axcess Shop**. The Data Counter can be a helpful tool for monitoring data usage, especially if your service agreement has specified limits.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press term of or Calls) and for Data Counter. The following options appear in the display:
 - Transmit View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has transmitted since last being reset.
 - Received View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has
 received since last being reset.
 - Total View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has transmitted and received since last being reset.
 - Erase Total Erase (reset) the Transmit, Received, and Total data counters.

Phone Modes

Standby Mode

Standby mode is the state of your phone once it is powered on and has found a wireless service. Your phone goes into standby mode:

- · After you power the phone on.
- When you press the key after a call or from within a menu or phone function screen.

When in standby mode, you will see the time, day, and date in the display as well as all currently active icons.

When in standby mode, you can:

- Make calls.
- · Receive calls and messages.
- · Access your phone's menus.
- Change your phone's mode.
- · Activate Voice Command.
- · Adjust calls ringer volume.

Receive Messages in Standby Mode

You can receive messages while in standby mode. An alert tone sounds and a notification message appears in the display when a new message arrives.

- Press the **View** (right) soft key () to view the message now.
- Press the **Ignore** (left) soft key () to view the message later.

Talk Mode

While in a call your phone is in talk mode. Press the left soft key () to display a list of In-Use menu options. (See See "In Use Menu Outline" on page 36 for more information).

Lock Mode

When you lock your phone using the **Lock Mode** menu option (see See "Lock Phone" on page 113 for more information), the following restrictions are placed on use of your phone:

- · You can receive messages and calls.
- You cannot make outgoing calls (except for emergency numbers).
- · You cannot access your phone's menus.
- . The volume key is disabled.

Unlock your phone by following the prompts and entering the lock code.

Silent Mode

With a single press of the key you can silence the call ringer and tones that your keypad makes whenever you press a key.

When you receive a call, the phone vibrates instead of ringing.

Enter Silent Mode

- In standby mode, press and hold the skey.
 - "Entering Silent Mode" briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

The Silent Mode icon (III) appears in the top line of the display.

Exit Silent Mode

■ In standby mode, press and hold the ■ d key.

"Exit Silent Mode" briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

Vibrate Mode

You can set your phone to vibrate whenever you receive an incoming call using either of the following methods:

- In standby mode, repeatedly press the **Down** volume key () on the left side of the phone until **Vibrate** appears in the display, or do the following:
- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), (for Volume/Vibrate), and (for Calls.
- Press the Left navigation key until "Vibrate" appears in the display, then press the key.

Text Input Modes

You use your phone's text input modes (Alpha, Symbol, Number, or T9 WORD) to enter text, numbers, or symbols into messages, events, and other functions. The current text input mode is indicated in the lower right part of the display.

Note: See "Entering Text" on page 41 for more information about text input modes.

Alpha Mode

Enter characters while in Alpha mode by pressing the key with the desired characters (such as [=...] for "a").

- Press the key repeatedly until the desired character (letter, number, or symbol) appears in the display.
- Pause briefly and the displayed character is accepted and inserted into your message.
- Press 📲 to enter a space.

Tip: To enter large numbers of symbols or numbers quickly, use Symbol mode or Number mode as described in the following sections.

Symbol Mode

Symbol mode lets you use keypad number keys to enter symbols such as @ or % into a text message, event, or e-mail address without going through repeated key presses as with Alpha mode.

You press the key that corresponds with the symbol that you wish to enter. For example, press $\frac{1}{4} = 0$ for an exclamation point (!).

Number Mode

Number mode lets you use keypad number keys to enter numbers into a text message, event, or e-mail address without going through repeated key presses as with Alpha mode.

T9 Word Text Entry Mode

T9 Word recognizes a commonly used word that is represented by a sequence of number key presses and inserts that word into your message. (For example, entering '8378' would insert 'test' into your message.) Using T9 Word is much faster than the more traditional text input method (Alpha mode) and requires only one press of a key per letter of the word that you're entering. [For example, in Alpha mode, you would have to enter '83377778' for 'test' instead of entering '8378' for 'test' as in T9 Word mode.]

Note: See "Entering Text in T9 Word Mode" on page 43 for more information about using the T9 Word text input mode.

Roaming

What is Roaming?

Roaming lets you use your Alltel Snap phone when you travel outside of your Wireless Provider's coverage area. The Roaming icon (\P_{cont}) appears in the top line of the display when Roaming is active, and extra charges may apply when making or receiving calls.

Note: Some features may be unavailable while roaming. Roaming also consumes additional power from the battery requiring more frequent recharging. Contact your Wireless Provider for more information about Roaming.

How Roaming Works

Roam Option lets you set roaming preferences if you move in and out of your home network. The following roaming options are available:

- Home only Your phone is available for normal operation only in the designated coverage area.
- Automatic-A Your Wireless Provider's Preferred Roaming List (PRL) of networks is used to acquire service. If no preferred networks are found, any digital "A" system is acquired.
- Automatic-B Your Wireless Provider's PRL is used to acquire service. If no preferred networks are found, any digital "B" system is acquired.

This section explains the menu navigation for your phone. It also includes an outline of all the available menus associated with your phone.

Menu Navigation

You access the menus and sub-menus in your phone by using the Navigation key (), soft keys (), or a shortcut.

Navigate Using Keys

- In standby mode, press the **MENU** (left) soft key (
). The Main menu (the first of several menus) appears in the display.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to browse through the menus in your phone.
- Press the key to select a menu or sub-menu that then appears in the display.

Return to the Previous Menu

There are two methods for exiting a menu or list.

- Press the Back (right) soft key ().
- Press the BACK key (BACK).

Navigate Using a Shortcut

You can also access the menus and sub-menus in your phone using menu item numbers. Using the menu and sub-menu numbers in conjunction with the **OK** key () takes you directly to the menu or sub-menu of your choice. Before you can navigate using a shortcut, you'll need to know the menu or sub-menu number of the feature that you wish access.

Note: Use the list of menus and sub-menus, which begins on page 36, to navigate using shortcuts.

- 1. In standby mode, the **Menu** (left) soft key (). The Main menu appears in the display.
- Press the number of the menu, sub-menu, and so on for the feature that you wish to access.

Example: Press the left soft key (), then press the best key, and then the very key. This takes you to the Tools (Menu 5), and then to the Calendar (sub-menu 1).

Navigation key shortcuts

Some applications can be launched by pressing the Navigation key Up or Down (see the illustration) while in standby mode.



In Use Menu Outline

Your phone includes both a Main menu and an In-Use menu. The In-Use menu is accessible only when you are in a call.

- Press the Options (left) soft key (), while in a call to display the following options:
 - End call Ends the current call.
 - Contacts Accesses Contacts menu options.
 - Call history Checks your call log for outgoing, incoming, and missed calls.
 You can also erase your call logs from this menu.
 - Messaging Create and send text messages.
 - **Speaker phone** Places your phone in Speakerphone mode.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight an option. Press the ___ key to select the highlighted menu option.

Note: You can also press the MUTE/Unmute (left) soft key () to mute (caller cannot hear you) or unmute the current call.

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your phone. This section also describes how to use the T9 predictive text entry system to reduce the number of key strokes associated with entering text.

Text Entry Modes

You can compose text messages using alphabetical characters, symbols, and numbers. Each method of character entry (symbol, number, and so on) is called a text entry mode. There are four text entry modes, as indicated:

- Alpha Alphabetical text entry mode. Options are:
 - ABC All upper case
 - Abc Initial capital
 - abc All lower case
- **Symbols** Symbols entry mode. Enter symbols into your message by pressing the corresponding number that appears above it in the display.
- Number Number entry mode. Enter numbers by pressing the corresponding key on the keypad.
- T9 Word Predictive text mode. Press each key only once to enter the letter of the word that you're spelling.

Your current mode of text entry (**Abc**, **Symbol**, **123**, or **T9 Word**) is indicated in the lower left part of the display when composing a text message.

Note: Each of the text entry modes are explained in greater detail in "Messaging" on page 66.

Changing the Text Entry Mode

- 1. While composing a text message, press the Right soft key (-).
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the Entry Mode option and press the OK key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - T9 Word
 - Abc
 - ABC
 - 123
 - Symbols
 - · Add T9 Word

The current text entry mode is highlighted.

- 3. Use the Navigation key to highlight any of the other text entry modes.
- **4.** Press the \(\bigsim \) key to select the highlighted text mode.

Tip: You can also change the text entry mode to Abc, 123, or T9 Word by repeatedly pressing and holding the ** wey until the desired mode appears in the upper/lower right side of the screen.

Entering Text in Alpha (ABC) Mode

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 42 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

- Enter characters while in ABC (Alpha) mode by pressing the key with the desired characters (such as, pressing 4 m) once for "G").
- Press the key repeatedly until the desired character appears in the display (such as, pressing (a-m) two times for "H").
- Pause briefly and the displayed character is accepted and inserted into your message.
- 4. Press the sky to enter a space.

Entering Text in T9 Word Mode

T9 Word recognizes commonly used words for a sequence of keypresses and inserts the word into your message. Using T9 mode is much faster than the more traditional method Alpha mode, since T9 *requires only one key press per letter* of the word that you are spelling.

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 42 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

 While in T9 word mode, press each key that corresponds to a desired letter, in sequence, one time.

For example, when you press the key sequence ____ __ ________, a list of words that match the sequence of keys that you pressed pops-up in the display with the word "bad" highlighted.

- 2. Review the highlighted word.
- If the word is not the one you meant to enter, use the Navigation key to highlight another word in the list.





4. Press _ to add the highlighted word to your message text.

5. Now, for practice, enter the work 'Samsung' into your message by pressing each of the following keys only once:



T9 Word recognizes that the most commonly used word for the numeric sequence you just entered is "Samsung."

Adding Words to T9 Word

- 1. While composing a text message, press the Right soft key ().
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the Entry Mode option and press the OK key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - T9 Word
 - Abc
 - ABC
 - 123
 - Symbols
 - · Add T9 Word
- Use the Navigation key to highlight Add T9 Word, then press the OK (left) soft key (___). The Add T9 Word screen appears in the display.

Note: In the Add T9 Word screen, the text entry mode is ABC (Alpha)

- Enter the word you want to add to the T9 Word dictionary. (For more information, see "Entering Text in Alpha (ABC) Mode" on page 43.)
- 5. Press the **OK** (left) soft key (). "**T9 Word is added**" appears in the display, and you are returned to the text entry screen.

Entering Upper and Lower Case Letters

In Abc and T9 Word modes, you can select to enter only upper case letters (ABC/T9 WORD), only lower case letters (abc/T9 word), or a mix of the two (Abc/T9 Word).

While in T9 Word or Abc mode, use the ** key to change the capitalization setting. Simply press the ** key repeatedly until the desired capitalization mode appears.

The text entry mode indicator in the lower left corner of the screen changes to indicate the current capitalization setting.

Entering Symbols

For example, if the left soft key label is **ABC**, and you want to enter the word "ball", press the *** key until the left soft key label changes to **abc**, then enter the word "ball".

Tip: To enter a capital letter within a word, such as "SimTam", change the capitalization setting to **Abc** at the beginning of the word and before entering the "T". The capitalization setting will automatically change to **abc** after you enter each upper case letter.

Entering Symbols

Symbol mode enables you to enter symbols such as @ or % in a text message.

- While composing a text message, press the Options (right) soft key
 (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the
 display:
 - T9 Word
 - Abc
 - ABC
 - 123
 - Symbols

The current text entry mode is highlighted.

Use the Navigation key to highlight **Symbols**, then press the ___ key. The first of three screens of symbols appears in the display.

- Use the Navigation key to page through the other symbol screens, if necessary.
- 3. Press the key that corresponds with the symbol that you wish to enter. For example, on the first page, press 4- for an exclamation point (!).
- Repeat steps 1 through 3 to insert as many symbols into your message as desired.

Entering Numbers

Enter numbers into a text message while in Number mode (123).

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 42 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

While in 123 mode, press the key containing the corresponding number that you wish to insert into your message.

This section explains how to manage your daily contacts by storing their name and number in your Contacts. Contacts entries can be sorted by name, entry, or group.

Your Contacts List

Your Contacts list can store up to 500 numbers, with each contact having up to four associated phone numbers, two e-mail addresses, and a picture ID.

Each phone number can be up to 32 digits in length, including hard pauses. Contact names can be up to 22 characters in length. You can also assign a speed dial number for each phone number, and you can restrict access to the Contacts list to prevent unauthorized use.

Tip: One-Touch, Two-Touch, and Three-Touch Dialing allow you to call numbers stored in your Contacts list faster. (See page 25.)

Open Your Contacts List

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (), then press for Contacts. The following Contacts sub-menus and options appear in the display:
 - Find Find a phone number By Name, By Entry, or By Group.
 - Add New Entry Add a number or e-mail to your Contacts.
 - Speed Dial Assign speed dial numbers to your Contacts.
 - **Group** Rename one of your five groups.
 - Memory View available memory for dial entries.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight the Contacts sub-menu or option of your choice, and press the key.

Tip: You can also access a sub-menu or menu option by pressing the number key corresponds to the menu item number. For example, press and for Add New Entry.

Adding a New Contacts Entry

You can add an entirely new entry to your Contacts list or add information to an existing entry.

Using the Contacts Add Option

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (____), then press ____ (for Contacts) and ____ for Add New Entry. The New Contact screen appears in the display with the Name field highlighted.
- Use the keypad to enter a name for, or phrase to associate with, the Contact. (See "Entering Text" on page 41 for more information.)

3. Use the Navigation key to highlight one of the following fields:



- Enter a phone number or e-mail address for the new Contacts entry. (For information about entering pauses in phone numbers, see "Adding Pauses to Contacts Numbers" on page 49.)
- Repeat Steps 3 and 4, as needed.
- If you want, you can assign the new Contact to a Contacts Group by using the Navigation key to highlight the Group field:
 - Press the Set (right) soft key (____). The Select Group screen appears in the display showing the following options:
 - General
 - Family
 - Friends
 - Colleague
 - Business
 - Use the Navigation key to highlight the Group to which you wish to assign the new Contact, then press the **OK** key (_____). (For more information, see "Using Contacts Groups" on page 60.)
 The **New Contact** screen reappears in the display with the selected Group
 - name populating the **Group** field.
- If you want, you can assign a distinctive ring to the new Contact by using the Navigation key to highlight the Ringtone field:
 - Press the Set (right) soft key (____). The Preloaded screen appears in the display showing a list of preloaded ringtones.

Tip: You can also assign downloaded ringtones. For more information, see "My Ringtones" on page 82.

- Use the Navigation key to highlight ringtone you wish to assign to this new Contact, then press the **OK** key (_____). You are prompted to confirm the ringtone assignment.
- Press the Yes (left) soft key () to confirm the assignment. The New
 Contact screen reappears in the display with the selected Ringtone name
 populating the Ringtone field.
 Press the No (right) soft key () to ignore the assignment. The Prelease
 - Press the **No** (right) soft key () to ignore the assignment. The **Preloaded** screen reappears in the display.
- You can use the Navigation key to highlight another ringtone, or you can press
 to return to the New Contact screen without assigning a ringtone.
- 8. If you want, you can assign an identifying image to the new Contact by using the Navigation key to highlight the unlabeled Contact ID field at the top of the New Contact screen:
 - Press the Set (right) soft key (). The Select screen appears in the display showing the following sub-menus:
 - Image Gallery Lists downloaded images (for more information, see "Axcess Shop" on page 77).
 - Avatar Gallery Lists preloaded "avatar" images.
 - Use the Navigation key to highlight the preferred sub-menu, then press the OK key (). A list of available images appears in the display.
 - Use the Navigation key to highlight the desired image, then press the **OK** key
). You are prompted to confirm the image assignment.
 - Press the Yes (left) soft key () to confirm the assignment. The New Contact screen reappears in the display with the selected image populating the Contact ID field.
 Press the No (right) soft key () to ignore the assignment. The selected image list screen reappears in the display.
 - You can use the Navigation key to highlight another image, or you can press
 to return to the New Contact screen without assigning a Contact ID.
- 9. Press the **Save** key () to save the new Contacts entry.

Adding Pauses to Contacts Numbers

When you call automated systems (like banking services), you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time, you can store the numbers in your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- P pause A hard pause stops the calling sequence until further input from you.
- **T pause** A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.

Tip: You can enter multiple two-second pauses to extend the length of a pause. For example, two consecutive two-second pauses cause a total pause time of four seconds.

Note: Keep in mind that pauses count as digits towards the 32-digit maximum.

To store pauses in a Contacts entry:

- While entering a number you wish to store (such as your bank's teleservice number), press the **Options** (right) soft key (<a>li>. The following pause menu options appear in the display:
 - Add Hard Pause your phone pauses dialing and awaits input from you.
 - Add Time Pause a two-second pause.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight the pause option of your choice.
- 3. Press the **Save** (left) soft key () to enter the highlighted pause into your number sequence.
- When you're finished entering the number and pauses, press the Save (left) soft key () to store the number in your Contacts entry.

Assigning a Default Number

When you enter multiple numbers for a Contact (including a Mobile 1 number), the Mobile 1 number is the Default Number. That is, in the future when you find and select this Contact and then press the we key to call this Contact, your phone will dial the Mobile 1 number.

To specify another number as default:

- While entering a number for a Contact entry, press the **Options** (right) soft key (


Receiving and Handling Messages

Text Messages

When you receive a message, an alert sounds (unless turned off) and a **New Text Message** or **New Voicemail** notification appears in the display along with the closed envelope icon (or envelope icon the display:

- View Now Opens the message where you have the option to Erase, Forward, Reply With Copy, Save Quick Text. Lock/Unlock. or Add To Contacts.
- View Later Closes the pop-up and saves the message to your Inbox where you can view it later.

Use the Navigation key to highlight the desired option and press the **OK** (left) soft key ().



Voicemail

Voicemail allows callers to leave voice messages in your voice mailbox, and lets you review, play, and delete your voice messages any time you are in a network coverage area.

Voicemail Setup

Before callers can leave voice mail messages, you must first set up your account. See "Setting Up Your Voice Mail" on page 11 for more information.

Check your Voicemail

- In standby mode, press and hold the \(\frac{\tau_2}{2}\) key until you're connected to the Voicemail system. A recorded message prompts you for a password.
- Enter your password. Follow the recorded prompts, to listen to your voice message, change administrative options, and so on.

Inbox

Outbox

Drafts

- Use the Navigation key to highlight the draft message that you wish to review, then press the Edit (left) soft key (___). The Create Text Msg screen appears in the display with the message stext entry field highlighted.
- Add/change text using the keypad. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

- Enh. Delivery Ack Assign (On)/remove (Off) Enhanced Delivery Acknowledgement for this message.
- Add To Contacts Save the message recipient's phone number or Email address to your Contacts list.

Voicemail

New voice messages in your voice mailbox are logged in the Voicemail folder of the Messages menu. Open the Voice Mail folder to view the Callback # (if available), Urgency, and other details of new voice mail messages.

- Use the Navigation key to highlight the folder containing the messages that you wish to delete, then press the OK (left) soft key (____). You are prompted to confirm the erasure of all messages in the folder.
- To delete all unlocked messages from the selected folder(s), press the Yes (left) soft key (___).
 To retain all messages in the selected folder(s), press the No (left) soft key (___).

Message Settings

The **Msg Settings** options let you define numerous message content and handling settings such as ringer types and save options.

- In standby mode, press the Message (right) soft key (), then press m (for Msg Settings). The following Msg Setting sub-menus appear in the display:
 - **General** Settings that apply to all messages.
 - Text Message Settings that apply to text messages.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the desired sub-menu. Press the we key to enter the sub-menu. The following options appear in the display:
 - General
 - Auto Save Lets you elect to automatically save received messages (0n), not save received messages (0ff), or Prompt for saving received messages, until memory is full and depending on the Auto Erase setting.
 - Auto Erase Automatically erase oldest received message(s) after memory is full

- Quick Text Add or change pre-composed message text for insertion into messages.
- Voicemail # Lets you enter the access phone number to your Voicemail
 account
- Entry Mode Lets you specify T9 Word, Alphabet, or Number as the default message text entry mode. (For more information,)
- Callback # Enter or change the number message recipients can call in response to your sent messages.
- Signature Compose or change the text signature to be inserted at the end of sent messages, depending on the Insert Sign. setting.
- Reminder So long as the New Text Message or New Voicemail screen appears in your phone's display, a received message reminder tone plays Once, Every 2 minutes, Every minutes, or no reminder tone (Off).

Text Message

- Auto View Enable or disable automatic presentation of newly received text messages.

Axcess Shop Options

With Axcess Shop, you can download full featured applications over the air including games, personalized ring tones, pictures, and more. Send and receive instant messages and email, or browse the web to catch up on all the latest news.

- In standby mode, press the Down navigation key to launch Axcess Shop.
 The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess Shop icon (), highlighted.
- Press the Left soft key (). "Browsing online and downloading apps uses airtime." pops-up in the display.
- Press the Left soft key (__). "Select "Remove" if you don't want to see the airtime warning again." appears in the display along with the following options:
 - Yes Closes the warning message pop-up for this session.
 - Remove Blocks the airtime warning message from appearing in future sessions.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the option you want, then press ___. Axcess Shop options appear in the display.
- 5. Use the Navigation key to highlight the category of your choice, then press the Left soft key ().
- Select the application you wish to download and follow the online directions.

Axcess Shop Settings

Use the Settings sub-menu within Axcess Shop to manage, move, order applications and much more

- In standby mode, press the Down navigation key to launch Axcess Shop.
 The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess Shop icon
 (), highlighted.
- At the Axcess Shop menu, press the Down navigation key once to highlight the Settings icon (), then press the Left soft key (). The following options appear in the display:
 - Order Apps Download applications over the network.
 - Move Apps Move previously downloaded applications between available folders.
 - Manage Apps Allow you to manage previously downloaded applications.
 - Main Menu View Select whether you wish to view the main Axcess Shop menu in a list or icon format.

- Screen Savers View downloaded screensavers.
- Airtime Warnings Enable or disable airtime warning messages.
- View Log View the Axcess Shop log, which displays information about recent activity using Axcess Shop.

Axcess Shop Help

The Help sub-menu within Axcess Shop is a short tutorial on several Axcess Shop features. View information about charges, cancelling subscriptions, buying apps, disabling apps, and more.

 The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess Shop icon

Buying New Apps

To buy new and exciting apps, visit the Axcess Shop. It provides you with a variety of apps you can choose from.

What do I pay?

When you buy an app you will be charged for the purchase cost of the app and the network connections to download it. Charges will also apply when you use apps that require network connections, such as downloading information and sending text messages.

Charges

Charges will apply for network connections. A network connection is used when you are browsing the Axcess, downloading and restoring apps, or cancelling subscription apps. Charges will also apply when you use apps that require network connections, such as downloading information and sending text messages.

Cancelling Subscription

To cancel a subscription to an app:

- In standby mode, press the Down navigation key to launch Axcess Shop.
 The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess Shop icon
 (), highlighted.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight the Settings icon (), then press the Left soft key ().
- 3. Highlight Manage Apps, then press the Left soft key ().

Demo Apps

A Demo app is free and is designed to demonstrate the app's main features. It usually expires after a certain period of time or a number of uses and often has limited functions. When you run a demo app, you will be presented with a purchase option so you won't have to look for the app in the Axcess Shop.

Removing Apps

You may remove apps that are no longer needed. When you remove an app, you cannot use the application unless you purchase it again.

To remove an app:

This section explains how to use your phone's digital assistant functionality to schedule events, set reminders, create a "to do" list, perform calculations, and more.

Tools Menu

Tools is a suite of Personal Digital Assistant (PDA) applications such as a Calendar, To Do List, and Memo Pad that run on your phone. You can use your phone to schedule events, set reminders, create a to do list, perform calculations, and more with the functions provided by this useful feature.

Opening Tools Menu

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (___), then press very for Tools. The following sub-menus appear in the display:
 - Calendar Lets you view the current, past, or future month in a monthly calendar layout.
 - Memo Pad Lets you store and review useful information.
 - Alarm Clock Lets you set up to three alarms to go off at a specified time Once, Daily, Mon. – Fri., or on Weekends.
 - World Time Lets you view the current time of day or night in another part of the world.
 - Calculator Lets you perform calculations, including addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.
 - Stop Watch Lets you time events, activities, and so on to hundredths of a second.
 - Converter Lets you convert currencies (according to the latest rates) and weights, measures, and temperatures from one system or increment to another.
 - Tip Calculator Lets you quickly calculate service gratuities with a minimum of keypresses.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight an application, then press the OK key() key.

The following sections provide detailed descriptions of the applications and how to use their functions.

Calendar

Calendar lets you view the current, past, or future month in a monthly calendar layout. While viewing the calendar, the current date is highlighted and days with scheduled events are surrounded by a box.

Navigating the Calendar

1. In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (), then press () (for Tools) and () rep for Calendar.

A current month calendar appears in the display with the current date highlighted. The month and year also appear.

- 2. Use the following keys to move around within a displayed month or day:
 - Use the Up navigation key to highlight a previous day or event.
 - Use the Down navigation key to highlight a succeeding day or event.
 - Press the ** key to view previous months.
 - Press the [*] key to view succeeding, future months.
- 3. To return to the current day:
 - In the Month view, press the Options (right) soft key (
 A menu of available options pops-up in the display.
 - Use the Navigation key to highlight the Go To Today option, then press the OK (left) soft key (___). The current month appears in the display with today's date highlighted.
- 4. To jump to a particular date:
 - In the Month view, press the Options (right) soft key (). A menu of available options pops-up in the display.
 - Use the Navigation key to highlight the Go To Date option, then press the OK (left) soft key (___). The Go To Date pop-up appears in the display with highlighted date highlighted.
 - Enter the date, entering 2 digits for month and day, and 4 digits for the year.
 - Press the OK (left) soft key (___). The calendar display changes to the month
 and year of the entered date, with the entered day highlighted.

Add an Event

- 1. In standby mode, press the **Menu** (left) soft key (___), then press very (for **Tools**) and very for **Calendar**. The current month calendar appears in the display with the current date highlighted.
- Navigate to the desired date. (For more information, see "Navigating the Calendar" on page 88.)
- - Go To Date Lets you jump to any date you specify.
 - Go To Today Lets you jump to any date you specify.
 - Erase Old Delete all expired events for the highlighted date.
 - **Erase All** Delete all events for the highlighted date.
 - Add Add an event for the highlighted date.
- Use the Navigation key to highlight Add, then press the OK (left) soft key
 (___). The New Event screen appears in the display, with the
 Appointment field highlighted.
- Enter information about the new Event. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 41.)

- 6. Press the Down navigation key to highlight the Start Date field.
- Enter a new Start Date or press the Down navigation key to highlight Start Time field
- Enter the Start Time and press the Down navigation key to highlight the am/pm field.
- Press the Change (right) soft key () to select am or pm, then press the Down navigation key to highlight the End Date field.
- Enter an End Date or press the Down navigation key to highlight End Time field.
- Enter the End Time and press the Down navigation key to highlight the am/ pm field.

Tip: Steps 12 – 18 explain the fields you can use to assign unique alert tones and reminder intervals to your Events. To retain the default settings, skip to Step 19.

- Press the Change (right) soft key () to select am or pm, then press the Down navigation key to highlight the Ringer – Tone/Vibrate field.

Location Setting

In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and () for Location.

The following options appear in the display:

- Location On GPS location setting is on wherever the feature is available.
- 911 Only GPS location setting is on only when you dial 911.
- 2. Use the Navigation key to highlight the option you want.
- Press the Menu (left) soft key () to save the desired Location setting. You're returned to the Settings menu.

Display Settings

Using the **Display** menu, you can set the menu style, set the standby mode animation, customize the backlight settings, and more.

 - My Images Lets you select an image that you have downloaded to your phone.
 - **Preset Images** Lets you select an image that is included with your phone.
 - Image Shuffle Lets you select multiple images. These images are shown in random order
- 2. Use the Navigation key to select My Images, Preset Images, or Image Shuffle images, then press the OK (left) soft key (\).
- 3. Use the Navigation key to browse available images for the wallpaper.
- To preview an image, press the View (right) soft key (___). The selected image fills the screen.

Clock Format

Health and Safety Information

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government.

These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

Samsung Mobile Products and Recycling

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

Head: 1.39 W/kg

Body-worn: 0.522 W/kg

Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies.

When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to

notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- · Federal Communications Commission
- · Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- · National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

· If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur. FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!

Responsible Listening

- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Responsible Listening

Caution!: Avoid potential hearing loss.

Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cellular telephones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound and distorted hearing.

Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings and equipment.

You should follow some commonsense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

 Set the volume in a guiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.

- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen
 to your portable device in a noisy environment, you noise-cancelling headphones
 to block out background environmental noise. By blocking background
 environment noise, noise cancelling headphones should allow you to hear the
 music at lower volumes than when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder if you are using an external antenna).

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Implantable Medical Devices

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device. Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference:
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

 Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. if you have any questions about using your wireless phone with such a device, consult your health care provider.

Hearing Aid Compatibility with Mobile Phones

When some mobile phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to

do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press the TALK key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association, One Batterymarch Park, Quincy, MA 02269. Attn: Publication Sales Division.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- · Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Product Performance

Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon (\(\begin{align*} \pi_{\text{align}} \end{align*}\)). The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- If your phone is equipped with an external antenna, hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Do not hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna, if applicable.
- Do not use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- If your phone is equipped with an internal antenna, obstructing the internal antenna could inhibit call performance.
- · Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone
 does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is
 inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Precautions

- · Avoid dropping the cell phone. Dropping it, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage to the phone and battery. If you suspect damage to the phone or battery, take it to a service center for inspection.
- · Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Follow battery usage, storage and charging guidelines found in the user's guide.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source.
- · Do not use incompatible cell phone batteries and chargers. Some Web sites and second-hand dealers, not associated with reputable manufacturers and carriers, might be selling incompatible or even counterfeit batteries and chargers. Consumers should purchase manufacturer or carrier recommended products and accessories.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F). The battery should not be charged at temperatures below 0 degrees C (32 degrees F) or above 45 degrees C (113 degrees F).
- Do not place the phone in areas that may get very hot, such as on or near a cooking surface, cooking appliance, iron, or radiator.
- Do not get your phone or battery wet. Even though they will dry and appear to operate normally, the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard.

- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a
 metallic object (coin, clip, key, jewelry or pen) causes a direct connection between
 the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when
 you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may
 damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Do not crush, puncture or put a high degree of pressure on the battery as this can cause an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-Ion batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
